## Milwaukee Road Beginnings: The First Train in Wisconsin

Step aboard a journey through history as we commemorate the 175th anniversary of Wisconsin's first rail trip—from Milwaukee to Wauwatosa on November 20, 1849—a pivotal moment that sparked the legacy of the Milwaukee Road. Greg Comly, Milwaukee Road archivist at the Milwaukee Public Library, will guide us through this landmark event and its significance. His engaging presentation will shed light on the origins of Wisconsin's first railroad, the early days of rail travel in the state, and the rich historical records preserved in the Milwaukee Road Archives.

Greg Comly was born and raised in Laramie, Wyoming. He earned a dual degree in History and Geography from the University of Wyoming and later completed a Master's in Library and Information Science, with an archives concentration, at the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee. Since 2016, Greg has been an integral part of the Milwaukee Public Library, where he has continuously strived to connect individuals with valuable resources and foster a love for learning. In 2021, Greg took on the new and exciting role as the Milwaukee Road Librarian in the Special Collections Department at Central Library. He is dedicated to preserving and showcasing the remarkable history of the Milwaukee Road.

## Governor's Archives Award: Preserving Images of Old

Joseph Cramer served in Company E of the 24th Regiment of the Wisconsin Infantry during the Civil War. In 1872, he made an investment of \$11.00 in a property in Grafton,

Wisconsin where he built a photo studio. Little did he know that it would be among the oldest photo studios in the country lasting for 137 years. The property was located at what has been now known as 1219 12th Avenue. In 1898, Joseph's son John, took over the business as a "daguerreotypist", what photographers of this time were called.

John ran the studio until 1903, when he sold it to Edward Laabs. Edward Laabs not only photographed people and places, but also some commercial businesses during his time of ownership, such as the Wisconsin Chair Factory in Port Washington and early Harley Davidson Company motorcycles. Later Laabs took in a young man named Walter Burhop, to work with him in the studio until a medical issue suddenly took Laabs life in 1926. The most likely person to carry on the business, was Walter Burhop, who purchased it from Laabs' estate.



Burhop made the most of running the business throughout the Great Depression Era, believing that during the depression people became more family oriented. Walter Burhop and his wife owned the business for 50 years. His business closed in 1971. Michael Matthies, a young Grafton High School physics teacher, had seen a "For Rent" sign in the window of the studio and was welcomed in by Burhop and was shown around. At that time Matthies, just had aninterest in photography, loved being in the darkroom at the high school and occasionally took photos of weddings and special occasions. Burhop made him a deal to rent the studio for \$125.00 per month to see how it went. Michael Matthies talked it over with his wife, Dale, and said it was an opportunity he could not pass up. He purchased the studio in 1977.

Michael Matthies was a genealogy buff and was passionate about history. He enjoyed running his business on the very desk that the Cramer's used in the 1800s. There was a beautiful Century View Camera from 1900 in the of Dice area that was similar to the one that would have been used by Laabs and Burhop. Matthies also used props that were left behind by his predecessors for special memories. by his predecessors for special memories. Many generations of families had their portraits taken on the same bench, chair or next to the very same pillar.



Matthies found a treasure- trove of more than 1,000 glass negatives in the studio attic, dating back to

1912 that most likely were taken by Edward Laabs. They were stored in old wooden crates, some from Eastman Kodak, piled one on top of another.

The largest glass negatives were 8" by 10 " and were commercial photos of engines, the Wisconsin Chair Factory in Port Washington and the Junger Stove Company in Grafton. The smaller negatives, 5" by 7", were portraits of babies, mothers, children, WWI soldiers and weddings. Some were images of local farms, businesses, fire departments, police departments, sports teams and one of Matthies's favorites was a photo of an old brewery wagon loaded with barrels of of beer that was hitched to a team of horses. Matthies marveled at the fact that in early years, Laabs had to cut his own glass plates and take all his equipment out to the site where the photo would be take

take all his equipment out to the site where the photo would be taken. His dream was to have "these plates scanned and out online so people could see them".

Michael Matthies died November of 2009 and the studio was closed and left undisturbed until 2024. The studio was sold at the end of 2024 and the Ozaukee County Historical Society and Grafton Historical Societies were invited to remove the glass plate negatives for cleaning, scanning and digitizing for further preservation. Volunteers carefully removed all the wooden crates from the attic and boxed the negatives to be transported to a facility owned by the Ozaukee County Historical Society.

At least 30 volunteers from the Ozaukee County Historical Society and the Grafton Historical Society carefully cleaned and sorted all the negatives by category (babies, mothers, children, WWI soldiers and weddings and civic organizations). Some of the glass plates were in old paper sleeves with identification of the photos subject. These details have been captured and written on the plate to save for describing the image. Each negative will be photographed using a highquality camera and reverse imaged using the technology of Photoshop and Adobe Bridge software programs. Each image will be given a unique accession (catalog) number that will be loaded into the Past Perfect archival database. These images will be readily searcha-

ble and printable. Future plans to share with the public will depend on the wishes of the Matthies family.

This has been an enormous undertaking by the Ozaukee County Historical Society and Grafton Historical Society in preserving the legacy of these photographers from over a century ago. This project truly is to preserve a collection that could have been destroyed or forgotten. The passion of both of these organizations to preserve this incredible piece of history and share it with the community, which echoes the desire of Michael Matthies. For this reason, we nominate them for the 2025 Governor's Archival Achievement Award.







### **EXCITING NEWS! HISTORIC LOG CABIN IS MOVED**

The 1850s log cabin, donated by Mike and Nancy Byers of Cedarburg, was moved to Ozaukee County Pioneer Village on Friday, March 21st.

This is the first building moved to the village in over 20 years. The building movers were DeVooght House Movers from Manitowoc.

The foundation will be built in the next month or two and DeVooght will come back to set the cabin on its own foundation.

The purpose of the building will be to set up a print shop that will provide demonstrations of the print trade of old.

Her passion for history and local heritage led her to volunteer as a Stone House tour guide and to operate the print shop at Ozaukee County Pioneer Village alongside Armand, after founding their family printing business in

### WHAT'S COOKIN' OZAUKEE COUNTY: GRAHAM CRACKER CREAM PIE

Step 1: Pie Crust	Step 2: Custard filling:
16 graham crackers rolled fine	3 egg yolks
1 tsp flour	1/4 cu of sugar
1/2 cup of melted shortening, part butter	2 cu of milk
1/2 cup of granulated sugar	2 tbs cornstarch
1 tsp cinnamon	1 tsp vanilla extract
Take 1/2 of mixture and line pie tin.	Cook together until mixture coats the spoon. Pour into pie crust.

### Step 3: Meringue Filling


3 egg whites

Spread on top of custard. Sprinkle the remainder of the cracker crumb mixture over top of meringue. Bake in moderate oven (325 degrees) until meringue is brown.
