The little blue house that comes up next is owned by Lisa Burich. She bought it from Clara Holk and her son Jim. The next property is The Riverview Inn which was owned by Francis Roos who ran the bar and a small repair shop in the back. In September of 1963, Art and Darlene Wille bought the property from Francis and the repair shop closed. Art and Darlene had two daughters and they took over the business in 1996. In 2016, Lisa (Wille) Burich bought out her sister and now runs the Riverview Inn today. A tribute to her father is the sign on the front of the bar that says "Pizza is a work of Art:" Just a little sidebar... Lisa gets a big "thank you" from the Highway W people. When we have our annual or biannual floods, Lisa is always there with the coffee and sandwiches. Everything south of this is in the village and this report is solely about the part of the road that is in the town of Saukville.

Now starting on the West side of Highway W just south of the Schmidt property is now owned by John and Cathy Brunnquell. All of the land on the west side of the road was owned by George Jacoby and sold off as lots. The lot that the Brunnquells have today was sold to John Oberst who was married to George's daughter and they raised five children there. It was just a small house then and ended by what is now the kitchen window. They in turn sold it to the Lederers who had two children, they added on the piece which gave it the existing footprint. When they left, they sold it to the Waite family who had five children. They moved and sold it to the Petersons of Saukville. Mister Peterson passed away and since his wife never wanted to live in the country, she put it up for sale.

John and Cathy Brunnquell bought it in 1990. They loved the river and decided that was where they wanted to stay and raise their family of three so they added a second story to the house and later a boat house making the property what it is today.

The next piece of land is vacant and will stay that way as it is not a conforming lot. Eilene King got this piece of land in the divorce. She claimed she never owned anything in her life and she wanted something, so this is hers.

Continuing on the road to the south is a home owned by Renee Roos. She inherited this from her parents Bill and Dorothy Roos who bought it from George Jacoby.

Following that is a property that is now owned by Al and Joy Schanowski. This lot was bought from George Jacoby by Al Bradley in the mid 1930's. The next owner was Paul Thelan. Jim and MaryBeth Paape bought the house in 1968 from the Thelans, as they wanted to move up North. MaryBeth had passed away in November 2008 and Jim stayed living there until he passed in June of 2010. In April of 2011, the property was sold to Alan and Joy Schanowskis who live there today.

A bit further down the road is a home owned by Terry and Donna Elbe. The Elbe's bought the property in 1984 from Elmer Gardner who was the grandfather of Donna Elbe. The home was originally built by a gentleman with the surname Opica.

The last place on Highway W before the Village starts is owned by Dale and Shelly Buser. Dale worked for us at the farm when he was a teenager and his sister was our babysitter. Dale bought the home when his father, Bernie, who built the home died.

For most people, Highway W is a way to get from one place to another but as anyone who lives here knows, there is a lot of history along

our little stretch of highway. For as many tragedies as we have gone through together as a neighborhood, we have gone through them together. That can be said about the good times as well, perhaps more. Just as every neighborhood has a history, so does ours, and we couldn't be happier to be a part of it with you.

The Finishing Touches

After five years of fund raising and hard work, the Village Hall at Ozaukee County Pioneer Village is in its final stage of completion. The hall is being decorated with large photos and artifacts to bring the rich history of Ozaukee County to all who attend our events or rent the hall.

Allen Buchholz is spending the winter immersed in this project. The goal is to have at least two images from each of the nine communities in the county. Some of the prints are as large as five feet wide, while many are in the three foot range. 
1896 45-Star Flag belonging to Blacksmith from Port Washington


